**Approval for Procurement exercise for Wave 6 of Skills bootcamp training/upskilling with the associated delegated authority**

1. Purpose of the Report and Summary

- 1.1 The council has been commissioning education and training provision since 2022 through the Skills Bootcamp programme to complement training that is provided internally through the Council's internal training service.
- 1.2 The Town Clerk's service has developed a Dynamic Purchasing System to facilitate the associated Procurement exercises associated with the next wave of courses.

Recommendations

- 2.1 That the leader approves via the appropriate route of delegated authority to the Director/Assistant Director of Economic Development and Regeneration for the tendering/procurement exercise for Wave 6 of Skills Bootcamp training initiatives via the established Dynamic Purchasing System to meet the requirements of the Council to call upon provision for training providers of Education training where required.
- 2.2 The proposed budget for funding (now confirmed as per 26/2/25) via the DfE is £11,115,416.00.

To delegate authority to the Assistant Director of Economic Development and Regeneration to specifically run further competition tender exercises and manage future bids and associated contract award and budget management utilising the DPS.

### 3. Reasons for Recommendations

- 3.1 Hull City Council has applied for Wave 6 Skills Bootcamp grant funding from the DfE. The scope of the project as in previous projects in Wave 2,3,4 and 5 is to seek one or more service providers across all lots to deliver specialist technical Skills Bootcamps.
- 3.2 The Council has a continuing requirement for training providers to support the delivery of training for Council staff and residents within the city with a view to continuously improving and upskilling and therefore ultimately providing new and often unique employment opportunities.

### 4. Impact on other Executive Committees (including Area Committees)

- 4.1 There is no impact on any other Executive Committee.

### 5. Background

- 5.1 The Skills Bootcamps are led and administered by HTAE on behalf of the Hull City Council and the Dfe. The delivery programme will address employer led demand and will provide opportunities to train, upskill and contribute within the Digital and Technical sector. The project is open to all delivery providers that meet the eligibility criteria and will support the Authority to achieve its aim in contributing and commitment to retraining and upskilling.

The aim of the Skills Bootcamps is to deliver flexible training programmes lasting up to 16 weeks based on employer/sector “in demand” skills can be regulated (qualification) or non-regulated (based on the alinement of industry standards) enabling adults to do training around work and other commitments, looking to gain work, additional responsibilities and or access new opportunities and will offer a guaranteed job interview once the course has been completed.

The scope is to seek service providers to deliver various specialist technical Skills Bootcamp training. Each Skills Bootcamp shall be delivered by one Service Provider, with providers having the choice

to bid for one or more Skills Bootcamps. The opportunity to bid though shall only be available to Service Providers who have submitted a completed Standard Selection Questionnaire (SSQ) via the DPS, and the SSQ has been evaluated successful by the Authorities Procurement team.

Service Providers shall be expected to deliver high quality flexible training programmes to address the needs of adults aged 19+. Delivery is based at level 2 – 6 with a maximum delivery of 16 weeks and a minimum of 60 Guided Learning Hours (GLH) based on employer sector demand.

The contract will be until 31<sup>st</sup> March 2026 and will be administered by Hull Training and Adult Education (HTAE), Hull City Council. Scrutiny and Overview will be undertaken by the Executive Advisory Board (EAB) and all performance and KPIs monitored under existing Ofsted Education Inspection Framework (EIF) benchmarks

## 6. Issues for Consideration

- 6.1 The requirement to comply with Procurement Legislation Education service provision falls within the procurement Light Touch Regime. That regime provides the Council with greater flexibility in relation to securing its requirements, so long as it develops procurement processes that accord with the principles of fairness and transparency. Dynamic Purchasing Systems are long term procurement arrangements (10 years) that enable new suppliers to join the system from time to time, subject to such suppliers meeting the quality thresholds set by the Council. Once established users in the service area can commission the requirements from suppliers on the system. The Town Clerk's service now has experience of establishing a number of systems to enable their use by service areas. The systems have simplified the commissioning process and largely been welcomed by suppliers. The Council has been utilising an established DPS for the last 3 years with excellent results that have provided training and employment opportunities aligned with a compliant procurement route to learning providers.
  
- 6.2 Speed of access to suppliers. A key element of a system is that it enables opportunities to be made available to trainers on the system that can fulfil the Council's requirements. The areas of the Council that have a need for short term requirement are now better understood and lots can be established to cover the differing needs of Learning and Development for internal training, Hull Training for citywide provision, and I-Pass for the requirements of those who have a need for access to

Learning and Development associated with their physical and sensory needs.

7. Equalities Impact Information

- 7.1 No negative impact has been identified against any of the protected characteristics, no detailed Equality Analysis is therefore required.

8 Options and Risk Assessment

- 8.1 The preferred option would be to approve the use of the DPS through the appropriate delegated authority to allow Wave 6 to proceed accordingly and utilise the funding provided by the DfE to identify skills gaps and provide the relevant training and learning disciplines with a longer term view to providing employment opportunities for the residents of the city.
- 8.2 Do nothing – if the council proceeded not to approve the use of the DPS for Wave 6 funding for Skills bootcamps the opposite effect would take place – the appropriate funding would not be able to be utilised for identifying the skills gaps within the city and therefore denying the subsequent employment opportunities. There is also the risk that funding would not be provided for future waves should wave 6 funding not be approved to be spent via the DPS route.

9. Comments of the Monitoring Officer (Town Clerk)

- 9.1 The Council receives funding from the Department for Education for the Council to provide skills bootcamps. Skills Bootcamps are designed for individuals to develop new skills that employers in the local region are looking for.

The use of the funding for the proposed services is noted and supported, it will need to remain compliant with the terms and conditions of the grant funding from the department for education.

The proposed use of the Dynamic Purchasing System to tender the services is fully compliant with the Council's Contract Procedure Rules and the Public Contract Regulations 2015. (PG)

10. Comments of the Section 151 Officer (Director of Finance and Transformation)

- 10.1 The Section 151 Officer supports the tender of the wave 6 bootcamp. The contract will be funded by the Department of education (DFE). (SM)

11. Comments of the Assistant Director OD & HR and compliance with the Equality Duty

- 11.1 The content of the report is noted. There are no staffing or equality issues arising for the council from this decision. KH

12. Comments of Overview and Scrutiny

- 12.1 This report was considered by the Economy & Environment Overview and Scrutiny Commission at its meeting on the 13<sup>th</sup> of March 2025. The Commission supported the recommendations outlined at section 2 of the report, with a view to upskilling the local workforce and providing unique employment opportunities. The Commission also requested a 12 month performance update, with a view to ensure the programme is delivering against the expected outcomes. Ref: Sc8624 [AS].

13. Comments of the Portfolio Holder for Children's Services

- 13.1 The decision to procure further Bootcamp Training contracts, which are external funded through the Training Dynamic Purchasing System can be supported. This additional provision further enhances the ability to upskill individuals' skill set and provide employers with the much-needed boost to productivity.
