
Timeline

- UK is now in the sixth month since the end of the transition period
- Local Resilience Forum still meeting and focusing on Covid
- No significant issues highlighted for Hull and/or the region

Communications to local business

- Council has distributed 24 electronic newsletters to local business highlighting changes resulting from Brexit

European Union Settlement Scheme (EUSS)

- New campaign planned to highlight the EUSS and the deadline of 30.06.21
 - The campaign is focusing on using social media with literature aimed at schools and businesses in the city
 - Planned engagement with Community and Voluntary Sector to cascade information
 - Corporate website featuring the EUSS and support with registration

Trade changes – Revised Deadlines for Imports

- Exports to the EU from Britain have been subject to controls since 1 January 2021
- UK government introduced phased approach on EU imports to provide business with more time to adapt to arrangements
- Changes reflect the following:
 - **1 October 2021**
 - Products of Animal Origin and High Risk Food Not Of Animal Origin
 - **1 January 2022**
 - Customs import declarations and deferred declarations after import
 - Physical Products of Animal Origin checks at Border Control Posts
 - Physical checks on high risk plants at Border Control Posts
 - Documentary checks, including phytosanitary certificates for low risk plants
 - **1 March 2022**
 - Checks at Border Control Posts will take place on live animals and low risk plants and plant products
