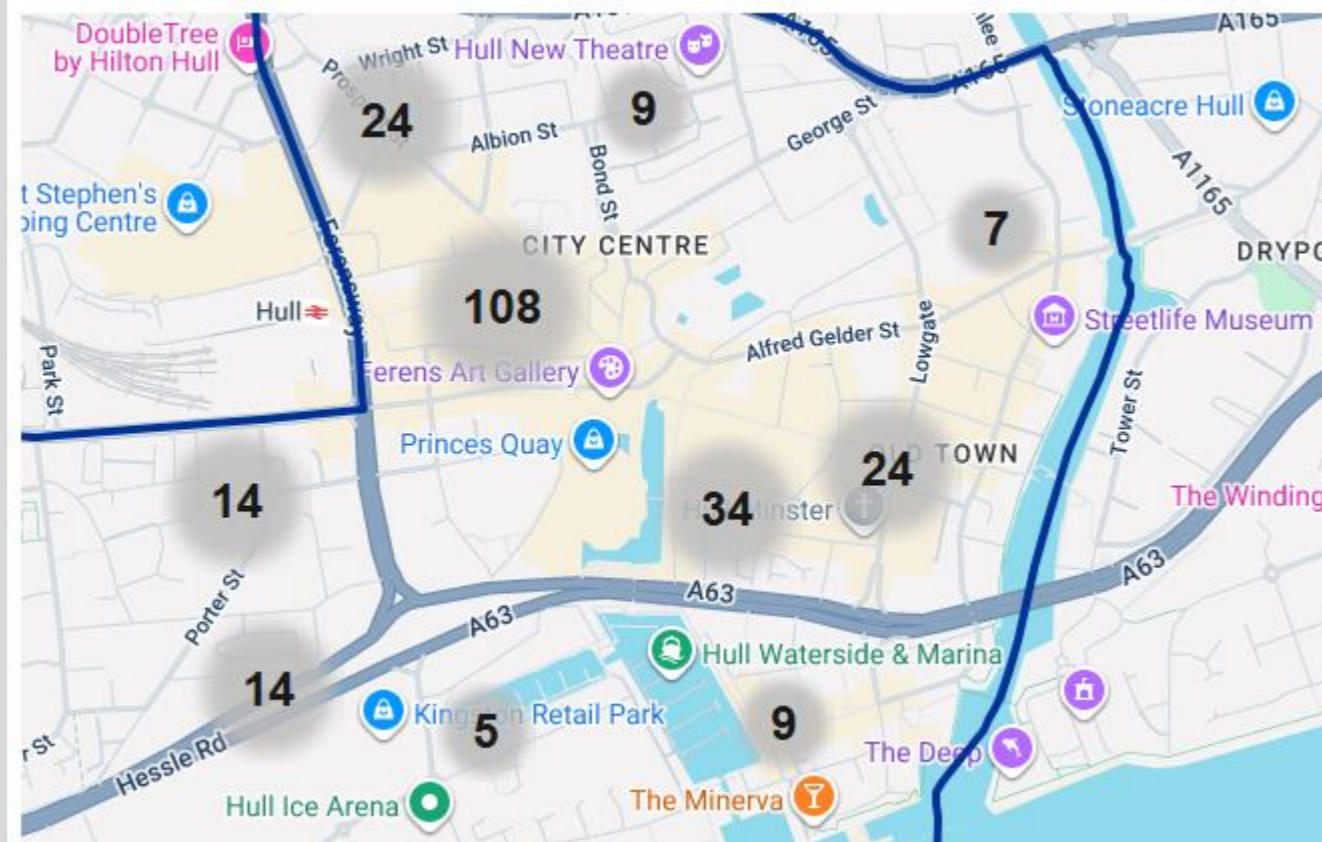

CPF32-01	Hull Bid West Area Committee – St Andrews and Docklands Ward	<p>Additional Radio Handsets & Consumables - The HullBID Radio Network provides an early warning system for ASB & criminal activity within the target area by connecting all the handset users together, and alerting the police, the BID staff, the Council's Neighbourhood Nuisance Officer and the Council's CCTV Operators. The link with Civic CCTV is essential as it enables them to follow perpetrators on camera as they make their way through the city centre and beyond.</p> <p>HullBID implemented a safety and security radio system back in 2010. There are currently around 250 members signed up to the scheme, including the city centre pubwatch scheme, shopping centres, the Interchange and Hull Royal Infirmary. Since its inception, the system has become a dependable way of drawing immediate awareness to theft, anti-social behaviour, demonstrations, lost children/persons and more. The applicant advises it is an excellent way of raising awareness of occurring issues to all those users listening in and that the radio system has enhanced the feeling of safety and security for those working in the city centre immeasurably. Further, it has also been critical in the apprehension of perpetrators of crime by the police.</p> <p>The applicant comments as time progresses, the demand from businesses (particularly those new to the city centre) for handsets is increasing and that it is not only retailers who wish to be included, but office staff, hospitality businesses, charities and more. HullBIDS understanding is that any new licensed premises are encouraged to join the radio scheme as part of their Licensing conditions.</p> <p>Unfortunately, due to cuts in HullBID's funding, the applicant advises they are no longer able to cover costs of supplying new radios and consumables, commenting the vast majority of businesses are struggling currently due to increased NI, cost of commodities and staff wages, and they would likely be unable to find the funds to cover costs themselves. This would mean they would have to opt out of the system, reducing its effectiveness.</p> <p>August 2025 figures for Hull City Centre</p>	Small	Yes	Provides a safer working environment and visitor destination. Shop theft being the 2nd highest crime for August 2025

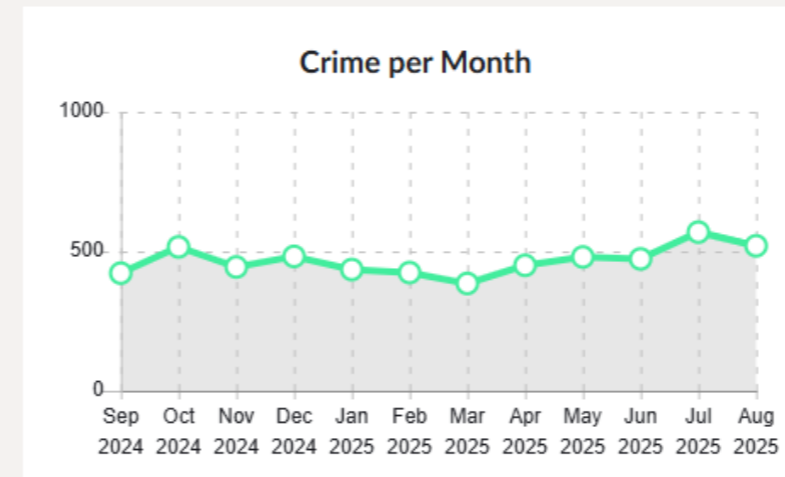

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Comments of Community Manager. Application supported. The two-way radio system has proved successful in alerting partners to ‘real-time’ incidents of ASB, criminal behaviour and civil unrest occurring in the City Centre that enable appropriate responses to ensure the safety of all visitors to the City Centre. Reach of the radio system now extends to VCSE organisations and the expanding hospitality sector in the City Centre. The project meets St. Andrews & Docklands Ward priority ‘to improve community safety in St Andrews & Docklands and West Area Committee - **AMBITION 2:** ‘Our neighbourhoods are safe and welcoming and there is access to good quality, affordable housing with good associated provision’. To support enhancement of the system for the maximum benefit of all throughout the City Centre, the grant will support businesses/members of the scheme in participating in the project in an environment of increasing business costs.

Recommendations and reason for these. Approved – promotes a safe environment to businesses and visitors to the City Centre, providing real time intelligence to inform appropriate enforcement action. Applicant to provide monitoring data/stats in relation to the use of the system.

CPF32-01	Victoria Dock Community Centre East Area Committee/Drypool ward	<p>Window Roller Blinds – Due to nature of the building having many windows, the applicant considers it necessary to have window coverings over each window for the following reasons:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - to ensure security in out of hours periods as there is much visibility into the building via the windows and intruders can view the contents so window coverings are needed to prevent break ins. -various groups and events need the building to be darkened for their groups and window coverings are needed for privacy. - To ensure security in out of hours periods as there is much visibility into the building via the windows and intruders can view the contents. <p>The applicant has confirmed that they have had one break in over 8 years ago but believe that this could have been averted if the intruders had not been able to see into the Hall. Also, that the provision of Window roller blinds would provide dignity and privacy for when activities take place. These include the toddler type music and sensory group (needs darkness for the neon lights), arts group for adults with learning disabilities, yoga classes x 2, inclusive arts group for adults with LGBTQ plus, children parties/discos that require darkness, alcohol support group, weight loss group, SEND craft club and Saturday GP clinics would all benefit from having the blinds installed.</p> <p>Police/Crime stats for this location show the level of crime & disorder that this project will address in reducing fears of crime amongst users of the building.</p>	Small	Yes, in principle	A safer and secure environment for all member of the targeted community hub users.

CPF32-03	St Marys Church North Area Committee/West Carr Ward.	<p>Fencing, CCTV & Target Hardening equipment – the applicant is applying for grant funding to help target harden the church, church grounds and Presbytery (Priest’s house). The church has already invested in crime prevention aspects but it is felt these need improving further due to an increase in criminal matters.</p> <p>This location and the Priest have been victim to repeated spikes of Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) and criminal damage and harassment by local youths. The incidents happen most years during the summer period until Police catch up with the offenders. Previously, the victim had under-reported such matters for fear of wasting valuable emergency service resources (this is no longer the case).</p> <p>As incidents escalate there is a risk of personal injury to the Priest who is soon to be 69years of age and lives alone, if he feels the need to protect the area or is caught while outside his address.</p> <p>The location is difficult to police with offenders having good line of sight to emergency vehicles attending via the roundabout and driveway and easy escape routes with the nearby underpass and open spaces. 		<p>the police to catch the offenders on site. The nearest civic CCTV is located on the roundabout and mainly monitoring traffic matters.</p> <p>A Designing Out Crime (DOCO) report was produced 05.06.2025 by a PCSO from the Neighbourhood Policing Team. The areas highlighted within that report for improvements are requested in this grant application.</p> <p>Discussions have been held with the West Carr Ward members who all support the application and with the parishioners of the church to check they are also supportive of the requests being made.</p> <p>Several meetings have been held with Neighbourhood Coordinator and the Priest to ensure the application is what everyone wants and what has been recommended in the DOCO report provided by Humberside Police.</p> <p>The requested work includes supply, installation of</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> *Fencing in which Hull City Council contractor – Tony Cook Ltd would be utilised. *CCTV by a private firm – two companies were requested to provide a quote. The church is a private premise hence not combining with Hull City Council and Civic CCTV. *Target hardening equipment would be supplied as recommended by Humberside Police. <p>The new fencing would be green mesh and therefore not as easy to be damaged or climbed upon. It would be 3m high and enable the site to still be welcoming for visitors (this was really important to the priest). The Church is also committed to rewilding the area to ensure the back of the church and the side along the public footpath is covered with dense hedging and briers.</p> <p>The new CCTV system would be hard wired with 7x cameras that utilises night mode and features active deterrents including sounders, strobes and an audio warning. Replacement PIR lighting would enable better visibility to those emergency services responding to incidents and for the Priest to know of any intruders. It would also ensure better quality CCTV images.</p> <p>Target hardening (padlocks, signage, anti-climb paint, etc) would ensure occupiers liability and insurance requirements was met in warning people they are being recorded, and that anti-climb paint had been utilised.</p> <p><u>Site Location Map</u></p>  <p>Recent crime Incidents reported by the address since 01/01/2025:</p>			
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		<p>A) 25*73378 – 29/05/2025 - Youths throwing stones have hit and smashed the outer pain of the Priests house, not the church</p> <p>B) 25*75797 – 02/06/2025 - Group of 4 youths climb onto the roof of the church, they throw stones at a near dwelling and pull tiles off the roof, damaged caused to the roof tiles.</p> <p>During the period 02.06.2025 until 07.08.2025 there has been another 5x incidents:</p> <p>C) 25*77967 – Criminal Damage - Group of unknown juvenile suspects have taken an unknown number of roof tiles off of the church roof and thrown them at the victim's house. No damage caused to house however tiles taken from the roof have been broken. Unknown value of damage.</p> <p>D) 25*80543 – Criminal Damage - 4 youths attended location and caused damage to the wooden gate, pulling the post off causing the gate to fall – Suspect identified and charged</p> <p>E) 25*81087 – Harassment - Suspect approaches the gates between the church and the house and pushed open and broken causing financial harm to victim. Same group of youths have returned and thrown a broken bit of tile at the house window causing the outer panel to shatter before running off.</p> <p>F) 25*81113 – Criminal Damage - 3 male youths attend the church yard and kick at the wooden gate, which they have previously damaged and has been repaired. The suspects manage to the knock the gate over again. Suspects then make off from the area.</p> <p>G) 25*110578 - Same group of youths have entered a church yard and walked toward the house attached to the church. Suspect has then thrown a broken roof tile that they have brought with them at one of the windows on the house causing the outer panel to shatter. Suspect has then run off.</p> <p>The matter has been raised at the Area Place Based Tasking with multi-agency support for this application and with resources having been deployed to try and address the problem.</p> <p><u>Project breakdown:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Outer Perimeter Fence & Gate:34.3m of 3m high V Beam mesh fencing, galvanised and powder coated green (RAL6005) to areas as required and matching 3m wide double leaf gate to match £7,761.00 • Wall Fencing Pound: 14m of 900mm high V Beam mesh fencing £1,495.20 • Target Hardening equipment £453.43 • CCTV: Full coverage system, 7x 5MP full colour at night cameras, (cameras feature active deterrents inc sounders, strobes & audio warning £4,140) <p>Crime for August 2025 – top 2 offences relate to this project.</p>

Comments of Community Manager. Supported. Contributes to Ward Priorities 2, 'Work with partners to tackle anti-social behaviour and improve safety in the community' and priority 5, 'Work with partners and community groups to deliver events / activities promoting health and wellbeing to the resident of West Carr'.

St Mary's church is a community church on Bransholme. Beyond the obvious for a church re religious meets (including Holy communion / Baptisms, etc) it also has links with the local community. Every week there is a lady's group who meet in the meeting room and until recently also a men's group. The groups generally meet up to chat, do activities, afternoon tea, local fundraising events and generally (especially in winter) can use it as a needed warm space. The community have quiz nights to generate funds for charity. The church is also used by the local primary children in worship throughout the year and the community room hosts lunches for the elderly of which the children of the school (Mini Vinnies) cook and serve them lunch, talk and generally socialise with them. St Mary's Queen of Martyrs VC Academy is located very close to the church and as documented above and in name are interlinked.

Both the church and meeting room are used for Sunday school for children and other courses are often held there as well as other talk / groups that want to use it. It has also been used for Sunday morning tea/coffee and cake after Mass and if people in the area or parishioners would like to use the room they can do so. The church often supports Community Payback in offering a location for gardening.

Recommendations and reason for these. Supported, meets with the Crime Prevention criteria, Area Ambitions and Ward priorities. The project responds to evidenced ASB and criminal activity within this ward.

CPF32-04	St Philips Church East Area Committee/Marfleet & Bilton Grange	<p>New PVC Doors – To replace the current wooden doors to PVC replacement doors. The building has been subject to vandalism, suffering a lot with broken windows, but in 2019 windows were replaced with toughened glass and UPVC units. This has made it more secure, but the doors are still a significant security risk.</p> <p>Earlier this year the Church had a serious break in when the silver Chalice and Patten were stolen along with some items from the food community storage. The Chalice and Patten had been in the Church since it was opened in 1952. Additional security measures were identified as the wooden doors are old, rotting and drafty, and since the installation of solar panels in March, 2025, there is a new need to keep associated technology in the building which might hold value. WiFi connections are in place to support the community with this as a service and also to monitor the solar equipment. A new electric boiler is to be installed, supporting the delivery of a winter warm space for the first time in 3 years, but this demands complex and expensive electric adaptations.</p> <p>The applicant wants to repair the broken frame to the front doors and replace two sets of fire doors and a door directly into the vestry. These changes will make the facility much safer and will enable the Church to relocate the safe into the Vestry, a more suitable secure storage area.</p> <p>This is a small part of a larger refurbishment project for the building which will serve the community in the years to come. For this purpose, the Church appointed a voluntary Project Manager and an elected board of trustees. Necessary permissions have been obtained from the Church of England and HCC to make the changes; the applicant seeks support with the funding of the project.</p> <p>Two committees of volunteers carry additional responsibility for being a steady and consultative presence in these two settings in particular. One is the Food Community Senior Volunteer Team and the other is the District Church Council. One of their primary aims is to be part of the local communities, consulting, listening and ensuring that our communities are at the centre of the Churches activities. Partnership links have been established with many other local organisations who help inform our work that includes for example, several local schools, 11 other churches, Hull Food Partnership, Sport England, Hull City Council, Forum CIO, Hull CVS, EMS, Oasis, Citizens Advice Bureau, Groundworks, Friends of Alderman Kneeshaw Park and others. Part of the consultation for this particular change came about when many local people and organisations expressed their own anger and frustration over the break in when the Chalice and Patten were stolen. In 2024, 100,000 meals were dispatched to people in need in the immediate community. Most of these households contain people with disabilities. Many more are families with children. The building is used for community serving projects not limited to: A warm space signed up to HCC’s warm spaces charter; The Food Community, where local people find, not only food, but belonging and healing, and we work to reduce food waste and contribute to the citywide Food Poverty plan; Full Cup is a facilitated conversation group where people build their confidence and find common ground as well as learning to disagree well and be fed in the process. Three expressions of Christian Worship a week are offered every week. A new partnership is starting in 2025 with Sport England to provide free social exercise classes to help tackle</p>													



the movement crisis contributing to health inequality in East Hull, and local people and businesses can apply to hire the building at good value rates to hold private events, staff training, or classes. Space is also offered to Local Works who run a wellbeing art group. All of this is reliant on the security and safety of the building.

The preventative measures proposed will ensure that the building remains fit for purpose which is vital in order to provide quality services and support to residents in the area.</p> <p>The applicant comments the building is a key resource in the area offering a safe space to some of the most vulnerable residents in the community. The proposed works will ensure that service users are able to continue to access the facility as damage to the building will be reduced as people will no longer be able to access the roof.</p> <p>The photos are of the foyer area (purple extension) of the building taken from the front 2-sides.</p>  <p>Extra detail given by the applicant - Over the past 12 months they have had a problem with youths climbing onto their roof from the small building at the front of the centre. The trespassers seen climbing on the roof are known to the centre who have been identified as having complex needs. The Project consider that by contacting the police or raising this with the council as a tasking issue would be counterproductive. CPF32-06	The Peel Project North Area Committee, Central Ward.	<p>Building Modifications, associated equipment & furnishing to furnish the youth hub and community gym office space and gym- The Peel Project is opening its first dedicated youth hub and community gym in Central Ward one of Hull’s most deprived and ethnically diverse areas. This facility will give young people safe access to positive activities during evenings and weekends, the times they are most at risk of exposure to crime, drugs, exploitation and peer pressure.</p> <p>The youth hub will feature a chill-out space with games consoles, boxing and gym sessions led by qualified coaches and mentoring from youth workers and role models with lived experience. This creates a powerful balance between fun, fitness, and guidance, ensuring young people have trusted adults around them to support resilience, wellbeing and positive choices.</p> <p>An itemised list of items required for this project, to be funded by the Crime Prevention Ask is attached to this application.
