During the meeting the officer had confirmed that the paragraph relating to the constituent MPs being in full support of the proposals in relation to the allocation of the Pride in Place funding would be removed. Evidence was previously presented to 16 May 2023 Planning Committee on the need for additional planning constraints to preserve all entries featured on the Local List. • The evidence set out within this report pursuant to the completion of two rounds of public consultation supports the removal of permitted development rights for demolition of properties identified on the Local List but is not considered sufficient at this stage to exclude external alteration or change of use of the identified buildings. • To note that under Part B paragraph 5.22 of the Constitution the Planning Committee exercise duties relating to listed building consent and make additions to the Local List where objections have been received following the completion of consultation. 	
<p>51.</p>	<p>PRIDE IN PLACE IMPACT FUNDING ACCEPTANCE OF FUNDING AND DELIVERY OPTIONS</p> <p>The Executive Director of Regeneration submitted a report which sought approval for the £750,000 of the Pride in Place Impact Funding (PiPiF) attributed to the 2025/26 financial year to be allocated to the City Centre Grants Scheme (CCGS) residual budget, to continue with the highly successful city centre regeneration investment programme.</p> <p>A discussion took place and members commented that they were aware that the conversations with the local MPs in relation to the proposals were still ongoing; that there was support for the approach to allocating the funding which would assist in the speed of project delivery and meeting Government targets.</p> <p>The comments of the Economy and Environment Overview and Scrutiny Commission held on 11th December 2025 were noted.</p> <p>Moved by Councillor Drake Davis and seconded by Councillor Dad</p> <p>a. That upon acceptance of the £1.5m Pride in Place Impact Fund by the Council’s Section 151 Officer, the Assistant Director of Economic Development and Regeneration and Assistant Director of Major Projects & Infrastructure, in consultation with the Assistant Director of Legal Services and Governance, is authorised to align £750,000 of the 2025/26 PiPiF allocation into the existing City Centre Grants Scheme residual budget, to create a singular</p>	<p>Executive Director of Regeneration</p>

Reasons for Recommendations

- To ensure that £1.5m PiPiF is committed and spent by 31st March 2027 in line with the receipt of the grant funding, in order to make an immediate visible impact for the first year of the programme and ensure scheme objectives are met, it requires a programme that is already well developed. Therefore, it is deemed reasonable to align £750k 2025/26 additional funds to the CCGS, which is proven to be a highly successful regeneration investment programme.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • It is also deemed reasonable to align the £750k allocation for 2026/27 to the Community High Streets Programme as again, the scheme is already in development and delivery is expected next financial year, therefore, will be able to meet the funding deadline of 31st March 2027. • There is no associated revenue budget to deliver a standalone PiPiF scheme, therefore, utilising existing resources on both the CCGS and CHSP, and the tried and tested processes will be immensely beneficial to expending the PiPiF and associated outputs by the timescale(s) set. • The recommendations represent the optimal delivery route for the PiPiF, ensuring that value for money is achieved both with regards to the expenditure of the capital grant and with the appropriate delegations to enable the Council to meet the project delivery timescales and objectives stipulated by MHCLG. • By having the ability to amend the City Centre business grant criteria, it will provide flexibility to the Council in considering any relevant market factors and changes when reviewing its grant award criteria. This will particularly be realised if additional funding is identified in future years which enables the CCGS to continue. 	
<p>52.</p>	<p>HOUSING GROWTH PLAN – APPROVAL OF PROCUREMENT STRATEGY</p> <p>The Director of Legal Services and Partnerships submitted a report which sought Cabinet approval for the proposed procurement strategy to implement plans for delivering modern new Homes that meet the Council’s requirements pursuant to the adopted Housing Growth Plan for the city.</p> <p>The Cabinet was informed that the report supported the Housing Growth Strategy and Housing Growth Plan; that the report provided a framework for the delivery of housing schemes, and would allow the Council to enable use of the procured contracts by housing associations operating within the city and support joint working to deliver housing in the city.</p> <p>It was explained that the procurement strategy also covered East Riding given the wider geography of the Mayoral Authority.</p> <p>Members commented that there would be significant challenges in meeting the city’s housing needs; that the proposed procurement strategy would allow the Council to squeeze every opportunity and to make best use of land identified for housing schemes, and land opportunities which could present in the future.</p>

 - i. acquire s.106 homes, new build turnkey opportunities or other land-led opportunities or existing properties – either through RTB buyback process or those generally available on the market, including properties to be used by the Council for providing temporary accommodation – subject to viability and within the agreed five -year HRA Capital Programme.
 - ii. to launch a small sites, land-led homebuilding initiative whereby developers are encouraged to approach the Council with sites they have secured.
 - iii. to establish a refreshed loans and grants framework (utilising grants made up of right to buy receipts, Mayoral Combined Authority/devolved

- housing funds or government department housing funding) for community-led housing organisations and/or registered providers delivering housing growth projects.
- iv. to appropriate general fund land into the HRA for the purposes of bringing forward viable Council housing development.

Reasons for Recommendations

- The Housing Strategy and Housing Growth Plan established the framework for the delivery of housing, including affordable housing within the city and established the target numbers for delivery.
- There is a significant need for social housing in the city consequent upon the homelessness crisis in the country and having in place appropriately procured agreements through which to deliver housing is crucial to facilitating delivery.
- That housing needs to meet sustainable energy targets that will reduce the likelihood of the need for subsequent retrofitting, expedite delivery timeframes, minimise long term maintenance liabilities and maximise the benefit to the Hull economy through employment and industry opportunities. Consequently, the development of specification outcomes for housing must be carefully developed, balancing these needs alongside the requirement to deliver the maximum number of social houses with a focus upon encouraging the successful development partner to demonstrate innovation and a commitment to the city.
- Registered Social Landlords operating in the city are subject to duties to:
 - Co-operate with the local authority when it requests help, to help address the homelessness duties under Part 7 of the Housing Act 1996.
 - Help to offer accommodation to people who are in priority need under the local authority's housing allocation scheme.
 - Respond to reasonable request to consider tenants for housing.
- Access to the same agreements for partner organisations will assist the local authority to facilitate wider delivery through working with Registered Social Landlords operating in the city as well in partnership with the Mayoral Combined Authority and the East Riding of Yorkshire Council over the duration of the proposed agreement.

53.	<p>MEDIUM TERM FINANCIAL PLAN – UPDATE REPORT</p> <p>The Executive Director of Corporate Resources (Section 151 Officer) submitted a report that provided Members with an update on the latest Medium Term Financial Plan (MTFP) projections for the period 2026/27 to 2028/29.</p> <p>The Cabinet was informed that the Council had a good indication that Hull would benefit from the move towards the Government’s proposed Fair Funding model; that a multi-year financial settlement proposal for 2026/27 to 2028/29 had been confirmed; that following consultation on the Fair Funding proposals it was expected that there would be a weighting for local authorities with high housing costs; that the Council was expected to be in a better financial position than previously forecast, and that it had been acknowledged that local authorities would have to account for Designated School Grant deficits at some point in the future; that there were still some uncertainties around the final figures and it was expected that there would be some clarity provided later in the week, and that the Council would continue to create efficiencies whilst maintaining services</p> <p>A discussion took place and members acknowledged that there were still financial challenges to face for local authorities; that clarity around the final settlement figures had been expected by now however the confirmation that it would be a multi-year settlement had provided some assurance; that the dampening measures to control the impacts of changes to the funding model were not yet known, and that there were concerns in relation to the way in which local government was funded as the uncertainties created difficulties.</p> <p>The comments of the Overview and Scrutiny Management Committee held on 12th December 2025 were noted.</p> <p>Moved by Councillor Dad and seconded by Councillor Ross</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a.
